Fuller Center of Merced County – formerly Habitat for Humanity.

The Fuller Center of Merced County may be a new name, but its core of volunteers is from Habitat for Humanity Merced County.

The Fuller Center group recently met with City of Merced Housing Division and Inspection Services to outline their approach to building at least four owneroccupied affordable housing units in central Merced. The lots are located on I, 18th, and 19th.

The group responded to a Housing Successor Surplus Property Request for Proposals (RFP) and was selected by the City Council to build owner-occupied affordable units on four lots.

They are working on building plans to submit for plan check review. Concurrently City Staff will be working on the various agreements and Council action items which will lead to the site ownership acquisition and unit construction.

Their program requires sweat equity from the proposed homeowner. They also utilize other volunteers for services and materials to create true community projects. One home at a time is the model used by the Fuller Center. They plan to build one unit a year and think they may be able to do one and a half once they get started.

The Fuller Center has a list of income-qualified families. The homes will remain affordable for 45 years in a regulatory agreement executed and recorded on the property title. After that, the income levels must meet the Housing Successor and State Surplus Land requirements.

To further assist them, the City included funding in the HUD Annual Plan, which can help with soft costs for the housing construction.

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Run, Hide, Fight Training

On Tuesday, July 19th, the Parks and Community Service Staff participated in "Run, Hide, Fight" training offered by Merced PD. The training included several simulated demonstrations of what to do should a staff member encounter an active aggressor.

This type of training is essential, considering the rise in community-center, public-space, and school-based safety issues across the country. During the training, participants were trained to think through ways to run for safety, provide cover to hide, or fight until safety officials arrive on the scene.

The Parks and Community Service Department provides yearly community activities, camps, and sports programs. With concern for the well-being of children and families participating in these programs, staff must be prepared to respond should the need arise. The Merced Police Department facilitated the training. The Parks and Recreation staff thank Officer Martinez and Chief Cavallero for their professionalism, knowledge, and a job well done.





City of Merced Police Department Crime Analyst, Lance Eber, recently conducted a presentation at the **Environmental Systems Research Institute** (Ersi) 2022 User Conference in San Diego. More than 14,000 people attended the conference, and approximately 150 conference goers participated in the presentation.

Lance uses ESRI's mapping software to create maps, dashboards, forms, and reports to improve the Department's efficiency and further analysis on various topics. Some of his work is available on the Department's website under the Neighborhood Watch Program, Community Camera Program, Community Partner Map, and the Letter of Authority process.

The Water Department connected a new 12" water main in the Sage Creek area, tapped and installed a new 1" water service at Cameron Lane, connected a new section of 8" water main in the alley between 11th & 12th and G St & MLK Jr Way, as well as began the 11,000 Endpoint Replacement Project.
