# DESCRIPTION

The primary mission or "business" of the Parks and Community Services Department is to:

- Strengthen community image and sense of place: Parks, recreation facilities, programs, and community events are key factors in strengthening community image and creating sense of place.
- Protect environmental resources: By acquiring, managing and restoring valuable resources such as open space, streams, trees, greenways, and other habitat areas. Natural resources are protected and habitat required for the survival of diverse species is preserved.
- Foster human development: Parks and recreation services foster social, intellectual, physical, and emotional development of children, youth, and adults.
- Strengthen safety and security: Parks and Community Services staff provides safe environments for recreation, designs programs and services specifically to reduce criminal activity.
- Support economic development: Recreation programs and facilities attract and retain businesses and residents, as well as tourists. Parks and recreation provides jobs and generates income for the community and for local businesses. Park maintenance staff maintains parks and community facilities to protect public investments.
- Provide recreation experiences: Through programmed and selffacilitated recreations, a variety of benefits to individuals is achieved. Recreational experiences also are important as an end in themselves for personal enjoyment.
- Increase cultural unity: Parks and recreation increases cultural unity through experiences that promote cultural understanding and celebrate our growing diversity.
- Promote health and wellness: Participation in recreation improves physical and emotional health.
- Facilitate community problem-solving: Parks and Community Services staff has skills in facilitation and leadership that can be applied to resolve community problems and issues.
- The Code Enforcement program provides healthy, safe, and vibrant neighborhoods, as well as community level services.

Special emphasis will continue to focus on serving youth. Priorities for fiscal year 2007-2008 include: Implementing new technology and marketing plan, acquiring a park site master plan for CP-42 (community park in south Merced), expanding Code Enforcement staffing, and expanding youth, senior, volunteer and individuals with disabilities programming.

Support for Park And Open Space Master Planning, and advisory responsibility to the Recreation and Parks Commission, is provided by the Development Services Department. The Parks and Community Services Department staff along with the Public Works Department, support the Recreation and Parks Commission.

### **MISSION**

The mission of the Parks and Community Services Department is to plan, facilitate, promote, maintain, and develop activities and facilities that will enhance the quality of life in Merced.

### GOALS

- To increase the scope of the computerized registration program for the recreation division.
- To fully utilize the computer software with networking solutions that enable Code Enforcement Specialists to process cases on site. Case citations and cost recovery data will be completed prior to leaving the case location. Collections will be automated for revenue and cost recovery.
- To acquire a site master plan for South Merced public parkland.
- To launch an improved marketing plan for Parks and Community Services.
- To increase staffing levels in the Code Enforcement Division.
- To increase the level of youth activities through sponsorships from the Friends of the City of Merced Parks and Community Services, Inc.
- To continue coordination and cooperation with the Merced City School District and Merced Union High School District.
- To provide sports and youth programs at the McCombs Youth Center.
- To expand public parks, open space and recreational opportunities for residents in South and Southeast Merced.
- To seek grant funding for renovation of designated parks.
- To further develop Fahrens Park recreational facilities and park areas with support from Merced City School District.
- To foster new partnerships for new programs for seniors, youth, volunteers and individuals with disabilities.

## **OBJECTIVES**

- 1. Utilize the Parks and Recreation Management System with online capabilities.
- 2. Utilize new Code Enforcement software.
- 3. Secure funding for South Merced CP-42 master plan.
- 4. Maintain ongoing marketing plan including: quarterly tri-fold brochures for specific program areas, submitting standard press releases, and purchasing advertisements; improve counter customer service, telephone calls, information distribution, and e-mail response.
- 5. Increase staffing level in Code Enforcement Division with approval of one full time Secretary I position.
- 6. Provide youth camps, special events, youth trips and tours.
- Continue coordination and cooperation with the Merced City School District, MCOE Proposition 49 After School Program, Merced Union High School Distinct and Weaver School District through joint use agreements.

# PERFORMANCE MEASUREMENTS/INDICATORS

RecTrac computerized registration program with interactive on-line registration to be implemented by June 30, 2008.

Implement total software program for Code Enforcement with field operation capabilities by June 30, 2008.

Begin planning phase after finalizing purchase agreement to acquire new parkland in South Merced (CP-42) by December 31, 2007.

Provide improved maintenance of all buildings. Improve service level at Merced Senior Center with emphasis on rentals and senior activities. Provide increased level of part-time supervision.

Implement parks sound ordinance by June 30, 2008.

Continue planning, supervising, and directing the Mobile Recreation Program serving all neighborhoods in Merced.

Provide July Is the Parks and Recreation Month Event, City-wide Open House Program, City Picnic, and various neighborhood block parties.

Research, plan, implement, and evaluate various programs and activities addressing at-risk behavior at Boys and Girls Club and Stephen Leonard Recreation Center.

- 16. Sports Division Provide youth sports programs that promote sportsmanship, teamwork, and skill development.
- 17. Sports Division Provide adult sports programs that give participants a recreational outlet in an organized setting.
- Aquatics Division Provide quality aquatics program in clean, safe, and efficient facilities with emphasis on a youth swim lesson program that fosters community water safety.
- Fahrens Park School Site complete the transfer of 3 acres of land by Merced City School District to the City to replace the park land utilized by the district for a new school site.

# 2007-2008 BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS

- Parks and Community Services Department was again successful in collecting contributions from the Merced City School District totaling \$65,000 in support of the City's After School Youth Program.
- Recreation program, facility and park rental fees were adjusted. The RecTrac registration software program was launched and is used daily by staff.
- Several parks coming on line were named. Plans for the Rossotti Ed-zoocation building were developed and approved. A new Youth Commission was formed.
- Code Enforcement Officers provided access to wireless communication for field operations.

- The purchase of 38.9 acres in southeast Merced (CP-42) was completed.
- A joint use agreement was completed with Merced Union High School District for construction of a new practice gymnasium at the proposed Bellevue Ranch area high school campusl. The agreement guarantees City of Merced programming of gymnasium for recreation activities.
- Relocation of the Parks and Community Services Department to the remodeled Transport Center, providing space for all full-time staff including Code Enforcement division.

The City will continue to fund two-thirds of the zoo-operating budget. The Merced Zoological Society contributes proceeds from admissions and other fund raising for operating expenses.

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### PROGRAM

In accordance with the Merced Municipal Code, as a condition of approval of a final subdivision map or parcel map, a developer must dedicate land; pay a fee in lieu thereof, or both, at the option of the City, for neighborhood and Community Park or recreational purposes.

All in-lieu fees collected are deposited into this fund and may only be used for the purpose of acquiring necessary land and developing new or rehabilitating existing park or recreational facilities reasonably related to serving the subdivision.

The Development Services Department has completed an update to the Open Space Master Plan. This Plan is a significant tool in making decisions regarding when and where facilities are constructed.

### PROGRAM

Pursuant to the provisions of the Federal Block Grant, the City of Merced, as grantee, shall maintain a special revenue fund entitled "Child Development Fund" for the receipt and distribution of proceeds from the grant.

The City subcontracts with the Merced City School District for the operation of this program, including all day-care for school-age children for "off-track" students, after-school care for "on-track" students, and summer care for traditionally tracked students. The grant, in part, subsidizes income-qualified families for this program.

This program was previously referred to as the Youth Enrichment Program - YEP.
