Merced County Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO) Approves UC Merced Annexation into the City of Merced

This week, the City of Merced celebrated a major milestone with the successful approval of the annexation of the University of California, Merced campus into the city by county authorities. The annexation includes approximately 1,040 acres of the UC Merced campus and a vital two-mile stretch of Bellevue Road, totaling 1,140 acres now under the city's jurisdiction. This development marks a significant step in Merced's planned urban expansion, underscoring our commitment to effective urban service delivery and community growth.

Mayor Matthew Serratto commented on the importance of this achievement, saying, "The annexation is a pivotal moment in Merced's journey towards sustained economic growth and development. By incorporating UC Merced within city limits, we expand our geographical boundaries and enhance our community's educational and infrastructural framework. This decision reflects our dedication to efficient urban planning and superior service delivery to all residents."

City Manager Scott McBride also highlighted the benefits of this advancement, noting, "The annexation facilitates more cohesive planning and development between the City of Merced and UC Merced. This partnership will allow us to more effectively meet the needs of the university and the community, fostering an environment conducive to academic excellence and urban vitality."

Following a 30-day administrative review process, the Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO) will officially record the annexation. City services will begin in the newly annexed area, ensuring a smooth transition and integration for all stakeholders involved.

The City of Merced remains committed to maximizing the benefits of this annexation. We are moving forward with plans to enhance infrastructure, streamline public services, and promote sustainable development within the newly incorporated area, aligning with our broader goals of economic growth, business attraction, and improved quality of life for all residents.
