White Oak Frozen Foods will process locally-grown foods

The Oregon-based food processing company, Cascade Specialties, Inc. and the City of Merced, Office of Economic Development announced the expansion of Cascade's White Oak Frozen Foods Division to Merced last month.

The Company will establish a new food processing plant to process locally grown vegetables into Individually Quick Frozen (IQF) Reduced Moisture vegetables and fruits.

The company will occupy the former Arvin Sango plant on Cooper Avenue employing up to 30 full-time employees and approximately 100 seasonal employees.

Cascade Specialties, Inc., a subsidiary of the large Indian agriculture company, Jain Irrigation Systems, Ltd., is building this new facility to produce IQF Reduced Moisture vegetables and other related products under its division, White Oak Frozen Foods. The IQF Reduced Moisture process incorporates a continuous drying and freezing technology that results in high quality Reduced Moisture frozen vegetables that provide superior product, flavor and texture.

The move to the larger site increases White Oak Frozen Foods' handling, processing and warehousing capacity.

"Working with the Merced Office of Economic Development and TeamMerced has been outstanding," said co-founder Harold Archibald.

He and the building owner noted that the City's Economic Development Team was responsive; exceeding their expectations.

White Oak Frozen Foods' expansion with a modern facility, represents a multi-million dollar investment into the community.

Co-founder Dan Wilkinson of White Oak said, "We are pleased to bring a growth ori-

ented business to the Merced area that benefits from the good supply of raw materials locally grown.

"Building improvements are underway at the new site. We intend to open the plant by the end of 2012," he said. Jain Irrigation Systems, Ltd. is an international company with a presence in 120 countries and 7,500 employees. In June 2012, it was declared a winner of the prestigious "G20" Challenge in Inclusive Business Innovation.

However, we are discussing with the recycler potential changes in what is able to be recycled. We hope to be adding more materials to what can go in the containers.
