Home carbon monoxide detectors required Goal of state law is to prevent more deaths, injuries

As of July 1, all existing single family dwellings are required to install carbon monoxide (CO) devices if they have a fossil fuel burning heater or appliance, fireplace or attached garage.

All other dwelling units (multi-family duplexes, triplexes, apartments, dorms, etc.) are required to have them installed by January 1, 2013.

The CO devices are required to be listed by the California State Fire Marshal's office and installed per the manufacturer's instruction.

Carbon monoxide is a colorless, odorless gas that is responsible for an average of 480 deaths and more than 20,000 emergency room visits in the United States every year. The California Air Resources Board cites 30 to 40 avoidable deaths occur in the state each year from unintentional carbon monoxide poisoning.

Fetuses, infants, elderly people and people with anemia or with a history of heart or respiratory disease can be especially susceptible.

It is produced from heaters, fireplaces, furnaces and many types of appliances and cooking devices and can also be produced by vehicles that are idling.

A recent study found that nearly nine in 10 California households did not have a CO detector. Having a CO detector is a small investment that really can help save your life and the lives of your family.

DON'T idle the car in a garage -even if the garage door is open. DON'T use a gas oven to heat your home, even for a short time. DON'T ever use a charcoal grill indoors -- even in a fireplace. DON'T sleep in any room with an unvented gas or kerosene space heater.

DON'T use any gasolinepowered engines (mowers, weed trimmers, snow blowers, chain saws, small engines or generators) in enclosed spaces. DON'T ignore symptoms, particularly if more than one person is feeling them.

-Carbon monoxide poisoning symptoms

It pays to know the symptoms of CO poisoning.

At moderate levels, you or your family can get severe headaches, become dizzy, mentally confused, nauseated or faint.

You can even die if these levels persist for a long time. Low levels can cause shortness of breath, mild nausea and mild headaches, and may have long term effects on your health.

Since many of these symptoms are similar to those of the flu, food poisoning or other illnesses, you may not realize that CO poisoning could be the cause.

If you think you have CO poisoning, call 911 and find fresh air outside immediately.

We didn't get enough day use swimmers through the gates to recover costs, and with tight budgets, if a service doesn't pay for itself, we often can't offer it. (And there just

Pay online and save paper, postage or gas

The City of Merced offers a variety of ways for people to pay their utility bills without having to write a check and pop it in the mail or drive Downtown and wait in line to pay at the counter.

The different methods of paying utility bills are all listed on the City website, <u>www.cityofmerced.org</u>, under the Finance Department.

The greener ways include signing up for checks. monthly automatic payments. The amount of your bill is taken out of your bank account every month. You can sign up to use your credit card (Visa, MasterCard, Dis-

cover or American Express - no fee) on our website at <u>Municipal Services On Line</u>. Then you can just go online and pay the bills at your convenience.

Another easy green method is to pay with a credit card by phone by calling 209-388-7289.

Credit and debit cards can also be used at the counter or by mail. And we do take checks.

But if you are going to pay by cash, please do so at the counter at the Civic Center, 678 W. 18th St. Check your bill for the business hours.
