

Trains on time and so is underpass project

Construction of the G Street Underpass Project continues on schedule. The project will channel G Street under the Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railroad tracks so drivers will not need to stop for passing trains.

Crews from BNSF spent a couple weekends at the end of October installing the bridges that will carry the trains. The work was done at night, while the trains continued to run.

SLOW DOWN

The project has caused an increase in traffic on the neighborhood streets, and unfortunately people haven't been paying attention to their speed. Traffic officers report more than 600 speeding tickets were written in the area around the project in the first four months of work.

BUSINESSES ARE OPEN

Businesses along G Street remain open, and people are encouraged to patronize those merchants during the construction phase. There are signs directing people to the stores and shops.

Enjoy the holiday season with care, kindness, caution

The Merced City Fire Department would like to wish your family a safe and happy holiday season. Thanksgiving, Christmas, Hanukkah, Kwanzaa and New Years are a prime time for residential fires. Here are some holiday fire safety tips:

CHRISTMAS TREES:

• Unless your tree is a "choose and cut", re-cut at least 1 inch off the trunk bottom.

• Place the tree in a container or stand holding enough hot tap water to cover the stem at least two inches. Add water as needed.

 \cdot Display the tree away from heat sources.

 \cdot Use a stand that will hold the tree

securely and won't tip over easily.

 \cdot Do not locate trees in front of exit doors, in exit ways or corridors.

FIREPLACES:

• Have your chimney inspected and cleaned prior to burning season. Be sure it is equipped with a proper spark arrester.

 \cdot Keep screen or glass doors closed to confine embers and sparks.

• Never burn Christmas tree branches or gift wrapping in the fireplace.

 \cdot Do not leave children unattended when fireplace is in use.

LIGHTS:

 \cdot Use only U.L. approved products.

• Check for old or worn insulations, cracked or broken sockets.

• If using lights outside, be sure they are labeled "for outside use."

• Always unplug lights when leaving the house, retiring for the night, or not in use.

• Never put lights on metallic trees or run extension cords under carpets or heaters.

· Do not overload outlets.

CANDLES:

 \cdot Keep candles away from trees and other flammable decorations.

• Place in sturdy, non-flammable holders or non-tip containers.

• Keep candles far away from curtains and other combustible materials and not in windows or near exits.

 \cdot Never leave candles burning unattended or within reach of children.

 \cdot Extinguish candles by wetting the wick before leaving the room or going to bed.

Ask the City is an ongoing column answering questions that have been submitted to us by mail, email or phone. Readers can submit their questions to the addresses in the column on the left.

When I go down G Street I end up using the bike lane because I can't get to the street with my (motorized) scooter. Some of the sidewalks have a drop of 8 or 10 inches!

Back when G Street was built, handicap access was not a high priority. Times have changed and new sidewalks and intersections are designed to accommodate people in wheelchairs.

The City has a number of retrofit projects going on to add "curb cuts" at intersections so there is a gentle ramp for wheelchairs to go down to street level.

The City has plans to

overlay G Street from Park K.R. Merced Avenue to 26th Street in

City residents get charged higher fees when the wrong things end up in the refuse containers. The biggest problem with our blue containers is that we can no longer

take plastic bags, or anything in plastic bags. And don't add clothes, toys or any food waste.

The blue container can take plastic jugs and bottles, newspapers, clean cardboard, magazines, glass and metal cans.

By the way, the green container is for grass, shrubs, bushes, small branches and your cut up Christmas tree. No food waste, palms or oleander, please.

You can recycle your Christmas tree

Place your Christmas tree in your green waste container. Trees placed along the curb will not be collected. All trees will be mulched.

Please remove all ornamentation, including tinsel and tree stand.

Flocked (fake white snow) trees should be

chopped to fit in your gray trash can.

Trees over 6 feet tall should be cut into lengths of no more than 4 feet each.

Trees should not be burned in fireplaces. This can be very dangerous.

Apartment complex residents should put their trees in the garbage.
