Every drop is precious, so conserve our water

Every day residents turn on their faucets and receive fresh, clean, safe water. Millions of gallons pour through the taps for drinking, washing, cleaning and watering.

The City has more than 20,262 residential, commercial and industrial customers depending on our water supply.

City water is pumped from the underground aquifers and we need to guard our precious resource. On this page are some tips on conserving water and how to use the resource wisely.

Conserving outdoors

- ✓Water your lawn only when needed three times a week on your watering days, late at night or early in the morning to keep evaporation to a minimum.
- ✓ Check your sprinkler timers and reduce watering times to less than 10-15 minutes.
- ✓ Check your sprinkler heads, valves and drip emitters monthly for leaks and make sure sprinkler heads are aimed properly.
- ✓ Adjust your watering schedule for each season. In fall, you can reduce your watering by half. By December, you can turn off your irrigation system completely.
- ✓ Apply a layer of organic mulch around plants to reduce moisture loss and prevent excessive weed growth.
- $\checkmark Use \ a \ broom$ to sweep outside not a hose.
- ✓Ask your local nursery for suggestions on drought tolerant plants that do not need to be watered as much and can survive a dry period without any watering.

Conserving indoors

- ✓Turn off the water when brushing teeth.✓Run a full dishwasher. It uses 15 gallons
- a load no matter how many dishes, so run it full.
- ✓ Check for household leaks. Turn off anything that uses water and see if your water meter is moving. If it is, there could be a leak somewhere.
- ✓Install low-flow shower heads, kitchen and bath faucet aerators.
- ✓ Check for toilet leaks by putting food coloring in the tank and letting it set. Coloring in the bowl indicates a leak.

Help protect our water supply

The City Water Conservation Ordinance has been in place since 1993 and is in effect year-round. It promotes wise water use and discourages wasting water.

The ordinance prohibits: ✓ Washing of sidewalks, driveways, porches or other outdoor surfaces, except when necessary to protect public health and safety. However, buildings may be washed down once a year. ✓ Operation of any ornamental fountain unless it uses a re-circulating water system. ✓The washing of boats, motor homes, or automobiles and trucks with a hose that is not fitted with an automatic shut-off device.

 Running or wasting of water, such as excessive irrigation of lawns causing runoff and flooding.

Allowing broken or defective plumbing or irrigation A key component of our ordinance is the odd/even watering schedule.

Residents living at even numbered addresses can water on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

Residents living at odd numbered addresses can water on Wednesdays, Fridays and Sundays.

Only water before 11 a.m. and after 7 p.m.

The is no watering on Mondays, and no midday watering.

Merced FD joins crews around state

In June and July Merced Fire Department crews were fighting the wildfires raging in Big Sur and Shasta County.

Crews were rotated in for 10 to 14 days before returning to Merced. Their expenses are reimbursed by the state.

The firefighters are called up as part of a "mutual aid" agreement that means we lend our crews where needed and when we need extra help we will receive it from personnel around the state.

City firefighters receive about 100 hours of wildfire training initially and then have 16 to 20 hours of retraining every year.

cleaning dirt, dust and debris from the streets. It helps us keep in compliance with state and federal air quality regulations by removing tiny particles — PM 10 — that can become airborne hazards. A side benefit is it improves our quality of life.

Streets are swept twice a month, except in the Downtown. The Business District pays extra to have streets swept three times a week.
