

# Make this holiday season a safe one, and a fun one

#### TREE SAFETY

\*Make sure your artificial tree is labeled "Fire Resistant."

\*Check live trees for freshness. A fresh tree is green, needles are hard to pull from branches and they do not break when bent. The trunk butt of a fresh tree is sticky with resin, and when tapped on the ground the tree doesn't lose many needles.

 $\star$ When setting up a tree at home, place it away from fireplaces and portable heaters. Locate the tree out of the way of foot traffic and don't block doorways.

★Cut a few inches off the trunk of your tree to expose the fresh wood. This allows for better water absorption and will keep your tree from drying out.

★Keep the stand filled with water, because heated rooms can dry trees out rapidly.

#### Dispose of trees correctly

The City no longer has curbside collection of Christmas trees. Trees should be cut up into four-foot lengths, placed in the green container and put out for regular collection. The green material will be turned into compost that will be reused.

#### LIGHT SAFETY

★Check all tree lights before hanging them on your tree, even brand new ones. Make sure all the bulbs work and that



there are no frayed wires or broken sockets. \*Never use electric lights on a metallic

tree. It can be deadly.

★Before using lights outside, make sure they are designed for outdoor use. String lights through hooks or insulated staples, not nails or tacks. Never pull or tug lights to remove them.

\*Plug all outdoor electric decorations into circuits with ground fault circuit interrupters to avoid potential shocks.

★Turn off all lights when you go to bed or leave the house. The lights could short out and start a fire.

# Don't drink and drive

If you are going to a holiday party, make sure there is a designated driver. If you are hosting a party, make sure there are nonalcoholic drinks available, and don't let guests drive if they are under the influence.

If you see a drunk driver on the road, immediately call 911 before they ruin the holidays for someone else.

## Fireplace rules in effect

The San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District has a "Check Before You Burn" program in effect from November to February. The program prohibits fireplaces and wood stove use — including pellet stoves — on days when air quality is expected to be bad.

#### City offices close for holidays

## Treatment plant gets low-cost loan from state

Last month, the City's \$37 million tion. The UV treatments replace loan application was approved by the chlorination and eliminates the toxic State Water Board.

By using the State Revolving Fund loan with a 2.6 percent interest rate, the City expects to save more than \$13 million.

The City will provide \$28 million from local sources for the project.

The project will add tertiary treatment to the plant that includs filtration and ultra-violet (UV) disinfecby-products of that process.

The improvements to the plant were required by the state Regional Water Quality Control Board, which oversees the treatment plants discharges.

The City is expected to award bids on the \$65 million project in February. Completion is expected by the year 2012.

# Ask the City: What about my old RXs?

Ask the City is an ongoing column answering questions that have been submitted to us by mail, email or phone. Readers can submit their questions to the addresses in the column on the left.

How are you supposed to dispose of old prescriptions? I know you're not supposed to flush them down the toilet, but how do you get rid of them? G.D.

You're right, **DON'T** dump them down the toilet. Our wastewater treatment plant is designed to deal with biodegradable materials, not pharmaceuticals.

Some pharmacies will take back the drugs, so ask them. The drugs can be put in the trash if you take certain precautions.

Scratch your name off the container, add some water and something non-toxic but obnoxious, such as kitty litter, spices or charcoal. Seal the pill bottle with packing of duct tape and put it in a plain container for disposal. The Household Hazardous Waste site, 723-4753, located at the Highway 59 landfill, can help with your disposal.

## Utility rates increasing

Utility bills will be increasing next month based on the rate schedule approved by the City Council in 2006.

The increases are used to replace and upgrade equipment as required, for salaries, fuel and electricity and other increased operating costs. Sewer fees do include the costs to upgrade the plant to meet stricter standards required by the state. The fees are not used to pay for new growth or expand services to new areas.

The actual fees will vary depending on the Public use, connections, lot sizes, services and other 385-6841.

That's also the place to dispose of all "sharp waste" — the hypodermic needles, pen needles, lancets and other devices that penetrate the skin to dispense medications. State law now prohibits tossing those devices in the trash or in recycling containers.

Sharps must be transported in an approved container for sale at drugstores. A hard opaque plastic or metal container with a screw on cap also may be used.
