There are lots of preparations needed before a winter storm arrives, everything from making sure the roof is in good shape to not fertilizing your lawn.

What? Sure, why put something on your lawn that will just wash off into the streets and gutters? It saves you money and keeps our waterways clean.

All storm runoff ultimately drains into Bear Creek, Black Rascal Creek or our other natural waterways. All of us need to work to keep from polluting our waterways.

Use fertilizers and pesticides sparingly, so they don't just wash off lawns and plants.

Repair auto leaks and dispose of oil, fluids, batteries and other components the correct way. We don't want that stuff washing into our creeks.

Clean up after your pet. This is a leading



cause of polluted water in some communities and it creates health hazards as well.

Use a commercial car wash, or wash your vehicle on your lawn or other unpaved surface so the soapy water can biodegrade.

Clean up indoors after painting, not outdoors. Outside it can run off and end up in our creeks. We want to keep them clean!

I want to know what is the City Code re: parking RVs and boats on driveways? Obstruction of view of traffic is my concern and secondly they are eyesores to the community. MC, Merced

Our Code Enforcement specialists get this question frequently. They say: An RV or boat/trailer is the same as a car. It must be operational and currently licensed for use on public streets. It may not block or partially block a sidewalk.

If a citizen feels that a vehicle is creating a traffic hazard by restricting visibility, they may contact the Police Department and have an officer assess the situation.

As far as an ordinance prohibiting storage of recreational vehicles on pri-

vate property, we don't have one. A lot of subdivisions have CC&Rs (Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions on a deed) for this, but that is a civil matter, not enforceable by the City.

Buy or make a drop box (like the Post Office type) and place it in the alley way behind City Hall. That way we... can drop our payments off without the hassles of finding a place to park in front of the building or a block away.

This would be a great help for those of us who are disabled. The City of Dos Palos has this system and when I lived there it worked very well. DC, Merced

Rates up because of state requirements

The bills for City of Merced water and sewer customers increased in January to cover increased costs of operations.

Sewer rates went up because the State Regional Water Quality Control Board has increased the standards for discharge waters to meet federal requirements.

Now the City is required to add what is called tertiary treatment to the water before it flows into Hartley Slough.

The new standards also will require additional aeration of the effluent and a disinfection process using UV light.

The City's Wastewater



Effluent — the stuff going through the treatment plant — undergoes a number of tests as it passes through the plant.
