

State of the City 2008: Not bad, but a lot depends on the state

How the state solves its massive \$14 billion budget deficit will help decide how 2008 turns out for the City.

The early cuts proposed by the governor spared cities from any direct impact. But, the state budget is a long and convoluted process, with many changes before it is adopted this summer.

We know that the housing market in Merced is bad, just like Mart distributhe rest of the country. Permits to build homes dropped from 950 in 2006 to 181 in 2007. This year isn't looking much better.

The value of commercial building permits decreased from \$21.3 million in 2006 to \$9.3 million in 2007.

People still are planning their projects for the future. The Planning Department is processing 12 different annexation requests.

With UC Merced expanding by 600-800 students a year, the pressure on the community to expand remains. The City is working on a draft General Plan Update, designating which land will be used for what purposes. Public hearings are being held on fuel prices went through the roof the document at several stages.

Environmental Impact

Reports on the Gateway Regional Shopping Center are in progress, and a draft EIR on the proposed Waltion center is due shortly.

Crime is

decreasing in the City. The overall drop is small, 0.4 percent, but that doesn't take into account the nearly two dozen new police officers that are in various states of training. By the end of this year, they should all be finished with training and making a bigger impact

on the crime rate.

After two pedestrian fatalities near the intersection there was a strong call for the signals.

As you also noted, traffic does back up at the stop signs during peak hours. The stop signs at Yosemite and Stadium are temporary measures to get drivers used to stopping at the intersection and improve safety. We have a CalTrans grant to install a

signal at the intersection and it's J & A, Merced expected to be finished this Fall.

The signal will be synchronized with the lights at G and M streets to smooth the traffic flow.

Our engineers believe traffic flow would be improved with a curbed center median on that block of Yosemite with no left turns allowed from feeder streets.

We worked together with the college on the traffic signal, and we are willing to work with them on other traffic issues.
