

Arrests up in fight against juvenile graffiti vandals

Sometimes it seems that graffiti is all over the City. It's on building walls, wood fences, even shrubbery in one case. And it's a common sight to see surfaces that were tagged and painted over.

City residents are proving to be a valuable asset in the fight against graffiti.

Last month one resident was watching a baseball game at Merced High School when he noticed three youths spray painting a wall near the creek. The boys covered nine different places along a 145-foot stretch. The witness called police and officers arrested the trio quickly.

All three had paint residue on their hands, although two denied any knowledge of the crime.

In another incident, a resident saw two youths walking onto the Hoover Middle School campus with a spray can. Police were

Experts agree that graffiti must be covered as soon as possible to deny the vandal the satisfaction and peerprestige of displaying their crime. Graffiti left uncovered just attracts more graffiti. If it's on your property, report it and paint it.

called and caught the pair after a restroom door had been vandalized.



Without the public involvement in those two cases, the vandals might have escaped to trash another neighborhood.

The Merced Police Department has assigned an officer to the graffiti crime detail. He identifies and catalogs graffiti before it's covered so when a vandal is arrested the sus-

pect can be matched to other crime scenes.

Enforcement is moving into high gear. In 2006, there were 29 juveniles arrested for graffiti, last year the number climbed to 69 arrests. In the first three months of this year 20 juveniles were arrested for graffiti. Two adults were arrested for graffiti in that same time period.

Much of the graffiti has gang overtones, but not all of it.

The Merced County District Attorney has agreed to increase prosecution of graffiti vandals, and the Merced County Probation Department has agreed to increase the penalties imposed on juveniles in their custody.

The parents of juvenile graffiti vandals will also be accountable for their child's actions. As part of the punishment, they will be required to paint over graffiti and do other community service work.

City receives state grant to make routes to schools safer for kids

The City of Merced has received a \$866,000 grant from the Safe Routes to Schools program. The grant requires the City to provide a 10 percent match of funds

With the grant, the City will be able to install traffic signals at two schools, add side- stalled along Santa Fe Drive near Hoover walks, curbs and gutters at two other schools and provide 21 flashing school warning signs at eight schools.

The grant is intended to make it safer for children to walk to their neighborhood school.

City staff worked with officials from the Merced City School District and the Weaver Union School District to find out where the safety improvements were needed.

New traffic signals, costing approximately \$210,000, will be installed at:

Fremont School at 22nd and R streets. Farmdale School, at G Street and Gerard.

Sidewalks, curbs and gutters will be in-Middle School. The cost is \$160,000.

Sidewalks, curbs and gutters also will be installed along Gerard Avenue near Pioneer School. The cost is \$70,000.

The flashing warning signs, costing \$7,500 each, will be installed at:

- ★ Reyes Elementary School
- ★ Tenaya Middle School
- ★ Gracey Elementary School
- ★ John Muir Elementary School

- * Hoover Middle School
- ★ Burbank Elementary School
- * Peterson Elementary School
- * Rivera Middle School.

Yes, there are Good Neighbor ordinances designed to prevent these kinds of problems. Call Code Enforcement at 385-6855. They will notify the property owner that the yard needs to be cleaned up and action can be taken to force compliance.

In cases where there are public health or sanitation issues involved, the property can be cleaned up immediately and the owner billed.
