New directional signs guide visitors and residents around

of directional signs have sprouted up along the streets. The wayfinding signs sport a distinctive blue and gold color scheme, with the Merced Theatre topping them off.

The 80 signs are intended to help newcomers and visitors navigate around the City streets and find what they are looking for, whether it is the Civic Center, downtown parking or the Chamber of Commerce.

The signs are part of the Downtown Strategy adopted in 1999. A group of local citizens created the document that is a blueprint for the revitalization of the Downtown.

The group concluded that it doesn't matter how many historical treasures or shopping opportunities there are in Merced if no one can find them.

There's a new look to the City, as a series diverse number of places, from UC Merced to the Merced Mall, from the Applegate Park Zoo to the Merced County Fairgrounds.

> The first batch of 60 signs went up in August, with another 20 to be installed after that and 10 signs being held in reserve.

A special graffiti-resistant coating covers the signs to keep them free from vandalism. Designing, manufacturing and installing the signs has cost approximately \$110,000. The Redevelopment capital improvement funds can only be spent on one-time expenses.

Along with helping newcomers find their way around, the directional signs have an economic purpose.

It's been found that signs like ours lure people off the beaten path, and give them an opportunity to spend a bit more time and money in town.

Vacation is over, watch out for school children

That groaning sound you hear be a number of safety improveis from kids across the City saying goodbye to summer vacation and hello to the school year.

The idea of students heading back after Labor Day is "old school" as classes began in mid-August.

The start of school means more traffic on the roads, an increase of 21 to 27 percent according to a national study.

School safety tips

Watch for kids on foot or bikes when you back out of your garage or driveway. Slow down in school zones and watch for kids. Look out for kids playing or waiting at bus stops.

Not all streets have sidewalks, so beware of kids walking in the streets.

Obey the flashing lights and signs on school buses. If the stop arm is out, do not pass the bus because you might hit a child crossing.

Remember, there are a lot of drivers around area high schools who don't have much experience behind the wheel. Drive defensively.
