The "Field of Dreams" for one group of recreationalists is the City's new Disc Golf Course built in Fahrens Park.

The Disc Golf Course wasn't even officially open and the golfers were out testing the course.

The game of Disc Golf is conceptually the same as traditional golf. The object is to complete each hole with the fewest number of strokes.

But baskets are used to catch the discs, and the disc is tossed, not struck with a club.

There are plans for a second course to be built nearby.

Merino Park was named after the late Councilmember who served from 1946 until 1957.

Mr. Merino was a strong advocate for the City Charter who never missed a meeting in his 11 years on the Council.

He is credited with helping get the swimming pool at McNamara Park, improving the zoo at Applegate Park and building streets and sidewalks in South

The eight-acre neighborhood park has a ball field with dugouts, a basketball court, walking paths, picnic and barbeque areas, a restroom and playground equipment that includes a climbing wall.

Merino Park is located on the corner of Pacific and El Redondo drives.

The Disc Golf Course is located in Fahrens Park on Buena Vista Drive, just across from San Francisco Street.

WHILE SHOPPING:

WHEN LEAVING HOME:

Don't drink and drive! Always have a designated driver if you are consuming alcohol. Always watch out for drivers who are driving after drinking! They can be killers.

If you leave town for the holidays ask a trusted friend or neighbor if they can check your house daily and pick up any mail or newspapers. Be sure to tell them how long you will be gone and how to contact you. CHRISTMAS TREES:

If you have a live tree, make sure it is fresh. Saw off the bottom half inch and put it in a stand that holds water. Make sure it is well-watered.

Never use candles on a Christmas tree or other live greenery. Use only approved electric light strands. Turn off the lights before you go to bed.

Have your chimney inspected annually. Don't burn wrapping paper in the fireplace and only light fires on approved days.

Dispose of your live tree in the green refuse can. Cut the tree into pieces if necessary to fit it into the refuse container. The City no longer picks up trees that are placed in the gutters.

Workshops aim to help parents recognize the signs of gangs

Jan. 1. There will be no refuse City big rig parking lot open for truckers

The City of Merced has opened a commercial truck parking lot at the Merced Municipal Airport. The 23 parking spaces

are in a partially fenced, lighted lot with regular police patrol. The lot is located on Riggs Avenue, just off of West Avenue.

Two Charter amendments are approved

Merced voters approved two amendments to the City Charter on Nov. 6.

Voters agreed to an amendment imposing campaign contribution limits in the City Council and Mayoral elections and another that updates the Charter.

An amendment to give the council a raise to \$600 a month and tie future increases to the pay of general law cities failed.

Under the Charter amendment, individual donors would be capped at \$500 campaign contributions and an entity would have a \$2.000 limit.

The other amendment would change wording in the Charter to be gender neutral, allow for Council meetings outside of the Civic Center and delete sections that con-

tradict the state Constitution. That amendment also would raise the bid threshold on Public Works projects from \$5,000 to \$50,000.

If a project would cost more than \$50,000 the City must go out to bid on it. The \$5,000 limit was first set in 1948.

The Charter amendments are due to take effect early next year.
