

Merced Center construction beginning this winter

Downtown block is site of three different projects

The empty block of land across from the Merced Civic Center will become a bustling hub of construction activity this winter.

Three major construction projects are planned for the block: an eco-friendly hotel, the Merced College's downtown classroom and office building and a parking garage and retail store complex.

Construction on the parking structure is scheduled to begin in January, weather permitting. The three deck parking garage will have parking spaces for 335 vehicles.

The Merced Redevelopment Agency project has 10,180 square feet of retail space on the ground floor and will eliminate a blighted area.

Among the design features to help make the structure an eye-pleasing addition to the downtown will be antique streetlights, a sidewalk with brick paver accents and new street trees.

Merced College is building an \$11 million center downtown that will have 11 classrooms, 10 offices, a resource library and large conference facilities that can be used by hotel this spring. area businesses.

Programs housed in the 17,060-square foot building include the Center for International Trade, Computers in Business and the Employer Focused Training Center.

Wen Chang, a South San Francisco-based developer, plans to start construction on the

The hotel would become a prominent landmark in the downtown, and not just because of the koi pond in the lobby, the waterfall or the rooftop gardens.

The five-story structure would be a "green hotel" with a number of features that will increase its energy efficiency. Chang already

has built one green hotel in American Canyon in the Napa Valley.

The business-class hotel would have 140 rooms. The cost is estimated to be approximately \$16.7 million.

One parcel of land remains vacant on the block and City officials expect it will be used for offices.

City Council names parks and facilities

In December, the City Council selected names for 10 new parks and buildings across the City. Local residents submitted the names and a committee reviewed the names before making recommendations to the Council.

The park sites are in various stages of development. The names and locations are:

Dwight Amey Park: 7 acres, on Blux Avenue and Albert Drive in southeast Merced, for a civic leader and former council member.

Rudolph Joseph Merino Park: 8 acres, on Pacific and El Redondo drives in northwest Merced, for a former council member.

Richard Bernasconi Park: 8 acres, east of McKee Road and south of Yosemite Avenue in northeast Merced, the City's first croft and Arrow Wood drives in northeast elected mayor.

Merced Community Dog Park: 7 acres at R Street and Yosemite Avenue in northeast Merced. The committee noted it would be easy to locate because the description is its name.

The review of the Municipal Charter is expected to begin in January. The Charter has been amended eight times, but it has never undergone a full update since it was adopted in 1949.

The City Council created the Municipal Charter Review and Update Citizens Advisory Committee to provide comments and advice on charter changes. The ninemember committee was to be selected in January. Meetings are public and will be announced on the City Web site, www. CityofMerced.org and through the local media. For information. call 385-6866.

The Council must vote to put the Charter changes on the ballot and any changes must be approved by the voters.

Utility rates rise in February

The bills for City of Merced water and sewer customers will be larger next month. Residential sewer rates are \$26.95 a month as of Feb. 1, 2007 and flat residential water rates will be \$24.92.

The City Council approved the rate increase in December to pay for the rising costs of operations. In the case of sewer rates, much of the increase will be used to upgrade the wastewater treatment plant. New federal and state laws require that the City provide tertiary treatment of the wastewater and also eliminate the drying beds for sludge.

A plant expansion project will be paid for by new users through an increase in connection fees.
