Charter Committee says no to district elections, term limit changes

The Charter Review Citizens Advisory Committee continues to move forward in its review of the Municipal Charter.

The nine-member Committee was given the job of updating the Charter by the City Council.

Some of the changes recommended by the Committee are technical. The existing Charter requires that any project costing more than \$5,000 must go out to

bid, an amount selected back in 1949. The suggested change raises the amount to \$50,000.

Another change would make it clear that women and men can participate in City government by eliminating references to just "he."

Any recommendations must be OKed by the Council, and then approved by the voters. The goal is to have the changes on the November ballot.

The Committee recently considered a proposal to change the at-large election process to some form of district election. That proposal was turned down, with some members saying the City wasn't big enough at this time.

The Committee also voted against changing term limits for Council members or the Mayor and to leave the lifetime ban in

place once a member has served the maximum term in office.

The Committee also decided the current \$20 a month in out-ofpocket expenses for Council members should be increased to \$250 a month.

Do not water between 11 AM and 7 PM on any day, and never water anytime on Monday.

Remember not to wash down sidewalks, driveways or other outdoor surfaces except when needed to protect health and safety.

Buildings may be washed down once a year.
