City gets \$1.9 million grant now needs match for theater

The City of Merced received a \$1,935,000 grant from the California Cultural and Historic is expected to cost \$6 Endowment for the Merced Theatre restoration project.

The funds will be used to help restore the historic theater to its 1930s glory. However, the grant requires that the funds are matched. The Merced Theatre Foundation is developing fundraising ideas to obtain the match.

The theatre opened in 1931 and could seat 1,645 people. It was one of the first airconditioned buildings in the Valley and quickly became home to most major community events, from graduations to weddings.

Parking structure progress report

The Merced Center Project is on schedule, with construction expected to be completed by the end of the year. The parking structure will have 335 spaces and 10,180 s.f. of retail space. Work on the Merced College building, in yellow, also is expected to finish by the end of the year. The college building will hold classrooms, offices, a resource library and conference facilities.

Community task force works on gang prevention

Gangs have destroyed lives and property in Merced, and the community has had enough. A three-pronged effort is under way to reduce gang membership.

Local law enforcement agencies have formed a regional task force to arrest and suppress the gang members plaguing the community.

Experts say the other essential elements are intervention and prevention. The Merced Community Violence Intervention and Prevention Task Force is working to provide those pieces.

The task force includes representatives from local government, schools, the faithbased community, courts and probation and social services.

The group has a Web site that is providing resources to parents and others in the community to help them identify gang lifestyles and behaviors.

Work is under way on developing a summer jobs program for young people and also gang awareness workshops for parents.
